11.01 Review Nouns

Nouns are the largest class of words in most languages. They indicate whether the word is a person (eg, man), place (eg, country), or thing (eg, house, animals, etc.).

In English, most nouns are neither masculine nor feminine; they are “it.” For example: a mountain is an “it.” Whereas, in Hebrew, all nouns are either masculine or feminine.

11.02 Introduce Hebrew masculine nouns

- Hebrew masculine singular nouns do not have a particular ending.
- **Most masculine nouns are made plural** by adding “chirek”, “yud” & “mem sofit”- **ים** to the end of the word. (Note: “chirek” is not under “yod”; it is under previous consonant.)

Examples of 3 Masculine Nouns						
Masculine singular nouns	→	סֵפֶר book		הַר mount		זָכָר male

11.04 Grammar-Made-Simple: Masculine Nouns

- Hebrew nouns are either masculine or feminine.
- Masculine singular nouns have no particular endings.
 - Masculine plural nouns generally are made plural by adding a “chirek,” “yud,” and a “mem sofit” (**ים**) to the end of the word.
 - Singular: סֵפֶר (N-ms/Noun-masculine singular) → Plural סִפְרִים (N-mp/Noun-masculine plural)

11.05 *Parsing and abbreviations -- time savers!!*

Parsing helps us understand a word and what part of speech that word is.

For example, the parsing of סֵפֶר (book) is: Noun-masculine singular.

Abbreviations are a short way of notating a word's parsing. For example, parsing for the word סֵפֶר is: N-ms ("N" indicates that סֵפֶר is a noun. The "m" tells the word is masculine. "s" tells the word is singular.)

This is how we write the parsing for סֵפֶר (book): N-ms

- Right now, we will use only the following 6 abbreviations:

N = **noun** (often the "N" is followed by a "dash," indicating that the letters following are giving additional information about that noun; eg gender & number.)

f = **feminine**

m = **masculine**

s = **singular**

p = **plural**

art = **article** ("the": generally written with a "hay", "patach", and a "dagesh chazak": הֵּהּ)

- Hebrew abbreviations are not standardized. However, once you are familiar with these abbreviations, you will find it easy to understand the slight variations in some study books.

11.06 *Review Definite Article: the word "the"*

1. In English, the definite article "the" is a stand-alone word; however, in Hebrew, the definite article is not a separate word.

a. In Hebrew, the definite article is always attached to the noun.

b. The Hebrew definite article has 3 parts: "hay," a "patach," & a "dagesh chazak."

2. **Examples of masculine nouns with the definite article** (הַ):

דָּבָר (word or thing) becomes הַדָּבָר (the word or the thing; art;N-ms)

מֶלֶךְ (king) becomes הַמֶּלֶךְ (the king; art;N-ms)

נָעַר (young man) becomes הַנָּעַר (the young man; art;N-ms)

3. **Exceptions** occur when the **definite article precedes a guttural** (א, ה, ח, ע & sometimes ך). In this case the vowels under the "hay" change from a "patach" to a "kamats" (הֵ) or to a "segol" (הֶ). And the following consonant will not have a "dagesh". (Why? Gutturals cannot take a dagesh.)

Examples of a definite article with masculine nouns which begin with a guttural:

אָב (father) becomes הָאָב (the father; art;N-ms)

רֹאשׁ (head) becomes הָרֹאשׁ (the head; art;N-ms)

אִישׁ (man) becomes הָאִישׁ (the man; art;N-ms)

הָרִים (mountains) becomes הַהָרִים (the mountains; art;N-mp)

11.07 Homework Worksheet
