14.01 Hebrew prepositions

A preposition is a word that precedes a noun or pronoun. Prepositions give direction, time, place, location in reference to the noun. Some examples of prepositions are words like "in," "at," "on," "of," and "to." For example: the book is *on* the table. (The preposition is *on*).

14.02 Intro to stand-alone prepositions (aka independent prepositions)

First, let's learn independent, or stand-alone, prepositions. These are words by themselves.

- Examples of independent or stand-alone prepositions:

עַל (on, upon*), אֶל (to, for), תַּחַת (under), & אַחֲרַי (after)

** Note: Context is important. The English word you choose for translation can vary according to the context.*

- Examples of independent prepositions in a phrase:

before the father = לִפְנֵי הָאָב

after the man = אַחֲרֵי הָאִישׁ

until Israel = עַד יִשְׂרָאֵל

to the mountains = אֶל הַהָרִים

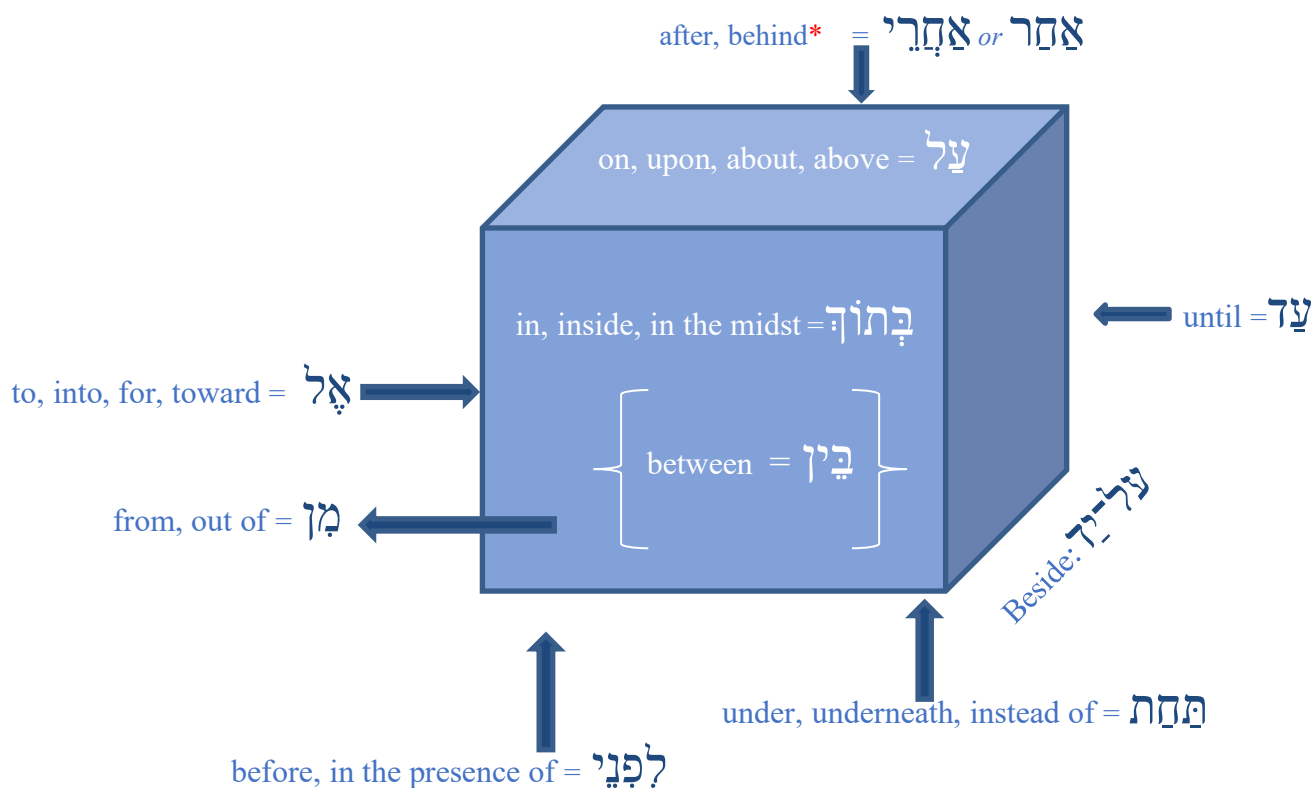
from the Torah = מִן הַתּוֹרָה

on the land = עַל הָאָרֶץ

under a mare (female horse) = תַּחַת סוּסָה

inside the heart (physical condition in the heart, not an emotion) = בְּתוֹךְ הַלֵּב

14.06 *Three essential fundamentals of Scripture study*

Literal interpretation: “Is my understanding of the passage literal?”

The literal interpretation of the Biblical text is reading the Scripture literally: understanding what the actual words mean within the context of that passage. Context informs if a passage is to be understood as a parable or an allegory.

Historical: “What did the passage mean during that time?”

Historical interpretation of the Biblical text is examining the passage within the setting in which it was written - from a social, economic, political, and religious perspective. It is also important to understand when that event occurred on the historical timeline.

Contextual: “Is my understanding of this passage consistent with all of Scripture?”

Contextual interpretation of the Biblical text is examining a word or phrase:

¹⁾ within the context of that passage,

- ²⁾ within the book in which it is located, and
³⁾ within entire Bible. (It is dangerous to pull out a verse without studying it within the Scripture at large. The misinterpretation of Peter's vision is an example of not understanding a passage within the context of the entire Bible.)

14.07 *Introduction to translating the Biblical text*

We are often asked which translation of the Bible is best. Truthfully, the very best translation is your personal translation. While this may seem over-whelming, we will guide you step-by-step. Good news: the abbreviations and parsing that we began introducing in Lesson 11 is the first step!

Parsing abbreviations we will use as we study the weekly parasha:

Person

| 1 | 1st person: the singular is "I," & the plural is "we." |
| 2 | 2nd person: the singular is "you," & the plural is "you all". Both singular & plural are gender-specific. |
| 3 | 3rd person: the singular is "he," "she," or "it," & the plural is "they." Again, these are gender specific. |
